World Friendship Day

FFCNC recognized World Friendship Day by hosting an afternoon reception March 2nd for a diplomatic delegation of ten government officials from the Central Highlands of Vietnam. They were visiting our community to study ethnic and religious minority issues, particularly in relation to the Asian immigrants living here.

The reception, held at the home of FFCNC President Ralph Cauthen, was well attended by club members. Some local Montagnards protested the delegation's visit, staging two peaceful nonviolent protests outside the delegation's hotel.

Since the visit, Ralph reports that some interesting things have happened:

- Montagnard leaders have met with political leaders of the city.
- The city Human Relations Council is moving toward establishing an International Advisory group.
- Discussions with Friendship Force International are focused on the possibility of putting the Vietnam Central Highlands on the itinerary of exchange groups, in response to the delegation's invitation.
- A state department official has written to Ralph: Without question, problems remain, but the more the Highlands are open to outsiders, the more we can identify any concerns and raise them with the authorities.
- The reception was the first example of cooperation between the Friendship Force and the Piedmont Triad Council for International Visitors which arranges for US State Department International Visitors Program guests. Other chapters around the country are also exploring such cooperation.
