Q&A: What is our policy about sending e-mail to FFCNC members?

The board passed the following policy in March of 2008 to moderate both the number and sources of e-mail sent to members. For practical purposes, just remember that EVERY submission must be sent out by Martha Brown!

Friendship Force of Central North Carolina E-mail policy

- E-mail may be used to communicate with FFCNC members regarding Friendship Force business on the local, regional, national and international level. Such communication may include, but is not limited to, meeting minutes, newsletters, and invitations.
- Members will indicate at the time of their registration in FFCNC if they prefer to receive such communication via e-mail, US postal mail or both.
- E-mail addresses of FFCNC members will be maintained with membership records and will be shared only with FFCNC members who have a need for this information as part of their FFCNC duties.
- E-mails will include "Friendship Force of Central North Carolina" as part of the subject heading.
- E-mails directed to the entire membership of FFCNC will be sent from one central source, the Communications Chair or their designee, and one e-mail address.
- FFCNC will strive to minimize the number of e-mails sent to the entire membership by consolidating communications as much as is reasonably possible.
- If there is a desire to e-mail the membership regarding a topic that does not concern Friendship Force business at any level, but is believed to be of interest to FFCNC members, approval must be received from two of the following three Board members: the current President, the Past President, and the President-elect.

Meet Your Newsletter Editors:

Carol Andresen

The Andresens joined CIU in Guilford County in 1994 and have held a number of leadership positions over the years. They went on exchanges to (Yamaguchi) Japan, (New Castle) England, (Huy) Belgium, (Nantes) France and (Maribor) Slovenia...and Fred designed and led a "cultural break" to Montreal and Quebec in 1998. They have hosted guests from (New Castle) England, (Loesser) Holland, (Nantes) France, (Aichi) Japan and (Volgograd) Russia. Fred is currently FFCNC's Vice-President – Membership...and Carol is publicity chair. She was president of the chapter last year.

Carol and Fred have lived in the same house in Greensboro for 35 years. Their three married children live in Boston, Atlanta and Tampa. Eight grandchildren, ages 10 to 4, set their agenda for frequent visits.

Professionally, Fred's work with Ciba Geigy brought them to Greensboro in 1973. Carol has been executive director of both the Greensboro Heart Association and National Conference for Community and Justice. She worked for the Center for Creative Leadership for 15 years, full time as a program coordinator and then part time as art coordinator for the Greensboro campus. Fred became an agri-vet business consultant in 1993 and continues to advise Piedmont Pharma, formed by ex-Novartis employees, as an initial investor.

Martha Brown

The Browns became involved with CIU in the early '90's when they lived in Greensboro and hosted guests from Hungary, Sweden, and Japan. As parents of school-age children, outbound exchanges at that time were not a practical option for the Browns, but in-bound exchanges offered a wonderful opportunity to see the world from their living room and to introduce their children to other peoples and cultures. At this time Martha worked in Information Technology at Novant Health in Winston-Salem and Dale worked as a financial analyst for Salem Investment Counselors also in Winston-Salem.

By 1999 the scales balancing work and family shifted and Martha departed the corporate scene. At this same time, the Browns moved to Winston-Salem where the children had always attended school. The Browns maintained their membership in CIU with hopes that more inbound exchanges would be planned and eventually an empty nest might allow participation in out-bound exchanges.

The news in 2006 that CIU and FF of Winston-Salem were merging was just the event needed to provide an opportunity for more active participation in the newly formed FFCNC. Martha has served as Communications Chair since 2007 and was co-exchange director for the Open World exchange from Russia last fall.

Their nest finally emptied this fall when their son entered Carnegie-Mellon University in Pittsburgh to study computer science joining his older sister in the college ranks as she continues her studies at UNC-CH and considers a career in healthcare. As a family, the Browns have traveled to England, Scotland, Switzerland, and, most recently, Russia where they visited with several of the Open World delegates.
