Since becoming president of Friendship Force International in 2004, Dr. George Brown's vision for Friendship Force has been "to significantly strengthen our membership and financial support both in the United States and globally. With greater numbers, we can better show the world how average people can have an impact on the peace process just by getting to know their neighbors in other countries through our citizen homestay programs. A world of friends is a world of peace." When he visits Friendship Force of Central North Carolina and speaks at our annual meeting on October 29th, you can anticipate learning more about FFI's recent initiatives such as 'themed' travel and reaching out to a younger demographic.

In addition to his many years of work at FFI, Dr. Brown served as the Executive Director of the Georgia Council for International Visitors, Director of the Global Awareness Program for Agnes Scott College, project manager for the AT&T Family-to-Family program that provided homestay programs for family members of Olympic athletes, taught international relations at Capital University in Columbus, Ohio, and served as a foreign liaison officer in the U. S. Army. He received his Ph.D. in International Relations from the University of Virginia and was raised in Korea as the son of Presbyterian missionaries.

The World of Friends Catalog

Friendship Force International has announced a new publication, "The World of Friends Catalog: Cultural Travel on Six Continents." This electronic catalog of exchanges replaces the E-Flyer. The new format is designed to improve the promotion of exchange opportunities. When you receive your catalog via e-mail you will have three viewing options (three choices to click on in the body of your email message.) You will be able to view the catalog directly from the FFI website or you will be able to view it either as a PDF document or Word document.

These last two options list the exchanges by continent and do not provide photos. The website viewing option offers additional features. You may choose to view a list of all exchanges or you may select a continent and view only those exchanges. Either way, you are presented a complete list of exchanges in chronological order (based on the travel dates) and a brief description. Clicking on a specific exchange will provide you with all the detailed information about that exchange. If you misplace your email, you can always access the catalog directly on the Internet by going to www.thefriendshipforce.org/catalog.

All exchanges in the new Catalog are available to participants from anywhere in the world and, therefore, "land only" pricing options will be provided. It is hoped that Friendship Force members will forward the e-mail to friends and family in order to invite more and more people to experience this unique way of traveling. All exchanges included in the catalog have been approved by the ambassador Exchange Director for inclusion. (Currently there are about thirty listed.)
