On the way to our Australia Adventure, we (the Kiszely family) took a detour to the beautiful island of Viti Levu (the largest island in the Fiji chain of 320 islands) with the North family. We decided to break up the travel time and give our body clocks a chance to reset by having some down time on a tropical isle.

Fiji is a mixture of Melanesian, Indian and Fijian cultures. The Indian population was introduced to harvest sugar cane many generations ago. Each ethnic group has a presence that can be observed as you travel around the island.

The few days of leisure somehow just did not occur. Jim and Ray left it up to Barbara and me to plan our days. We managed to pack many sights and experiences into the short time we were there. We stayed in the town of Lautoka which is about 18 miles from the airport in Nadi. The town center was very close to our accommodations, so we were able to walk around the town and become acquainted with it. The Central Market was the hub of activity with many stalls selling fruits, vegetables, fish and spices. We bought fresh fruit and veggies to enjoy with our evening cocktails on the little patio outside our room.

The most "touristy" activity that we decided to do was a visit to Robinson Crusoe Island. It was a dinner cruise down the Tuva River to the island where we were entertained with Polynesian/Melanesian South Pacific dances, fire walking, fire and knife dancing and a delightful meal which was prepared in a traditional Lovo Fire Pit. Any formal activity on the Island is begun by having a Kava Welcoming Ceremony. Kava is a dried root that is ground up into a powder and then prepared in water as a beverage. It is not alcoholic nor is it a drug; however, it did make my lips and tongue numb. It

looks like muddy water and tastes very much the same. Ray and Jim participated several times when the opportunity arose.

We discovered that the island truly ran on ISLAND TIME. Everything was laid back.



The Namuamua Inland Tour took us to a Fijian village. We boarded long boats that took us up the Navua River. We traveled through pristine rainforest, gorges and waterfalls deep into the Namosi Highlands. Village women were at the dock to greet us and escort us to the meeting house of the village. The village women had prepared our lunch and the men entertained us with song and dance. On our return to the village, we were given the opportunity to dive off a high platform into the waterfall. Some were braver than others and took the plunge. "NO Thanks!" was my response.

No visit to the beautiful crystal clear waters of the South Pacific would be complete without a snorkeling excursion. We boarded the White Whale schooner for a day of sun and fun. The ship was moored off a small private island where we had facilities for changing clothes and other personal requirements. We were served a sumptuous lunch and fitted with gear to check out the coral formations around the island. It was the first time I had ever seen a blue starfish. Our

day passed very quickly and it was soon time to head back to the big island. The crew played the guitar and sang Beetles songs which seemed to please everyone and before we knew it we were all singing and even a few were dancing.

Since our hotel was 18 miles from the airport we arranged for a car and driver to take us to a couple of places that we wanted to see before we left for Australia on our last day.

We visited the orchid gardens of the Sleeping Giant, which were enjoyed by all. The gardens were originally owned by Raymond Burr. He bought the land and had the orchids cultivated there. It was a gardener's delight. There is a very large Hindu Temple in Nadi which is ornately decorated with bright colors. The walls and ceiling were visual history lessons. Each panel told a different story of one of the Hindu gods. Our driver was Indian so we asked him to take us to a local restaurant for good Indian food. When we were ordering our dinner, Jim had a look of sheer terror on his face because he did not recognize any of the food on display. He was guided to plain Indian food - nothing exotic, and we all enjoyed the culinary delight.

The time had come for us to head to Australia for our two home stays with fellow Friendship Force Clubs so we said, "Bula!" to Fiji with hopes of returning sometime in the future.

What Exactly Does "Bula" Mean?

Bula Bula my friends. Say it. Just once, maybe twice. It is hard to say the words without a smile immediately parting from your lips. Go ahead...try it. The word is heard everywhere in Fiji. We have been assured by FFI in Atlanta that, though we will be the first FF club to visit Moldova, accommodations will be with host families. The duration of the exchange will be for one week, but it is too early yet to say if there will be an opportunity for additional travel before or following the exchange. We will keep you posted as we learn more.

Friendship Families

Every fall hundreds of international students arrive in the Triad to attend one of our many universities and colleges. The Center for International Studies at Wake Forest University, through their Friendship Family program, aims to assist WFU international students in their adjustment to life in the US. They are seeking families who are willing to be paired with an international undergraduate for the duration of the school year. They ask each family to get together with their student at least once a month, or more if the student and family wish. Suggested activities include regular family events or newly-created activities since cultural and traditional family students events help the acclimate American life.

This fall there are 60 new international students with 42 of them being from China or of Chinese heritage. Many of the students have spent some time in the U.S. either by way of vacations or boarding school, but very few of them have previously been to Winston-Salem. Regardless of their experiences and backgrounds prior to their arrival at WFU, if the students sign up for the Friendship Family program it is because they have a desire to experience the U.S. at a different level than they experience it on campus.
