Let it Shine!

Do you remember the children's gospel song many of us sang as a child? It begins: "This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine!" Charlotte Hamlin taught it to our Kosovar guests at the Welcome Dinner and it truly became the unofficial theme of the Open World program that began the day before on January 10.

The Welcome Dinner itself was a great success. Held on the Salem College campus, it followed an intimate get together with Salem College President, Dr. Susan Pauly, during which she spoke of the benefits of a single sex education and the accomplishments that grow out of such an education for women, particularly in the area of leadership skills. The dinner was attended by approximately fifty guests and included comments by exchange directors Ralph Cauthen and Ray Kiszely, introductions of all our Kosovar guests by their host families, and presentations by Charlotte Hamlin and Open World delegate, Albulena Sadiku, who spoke about Kosovar elections.



The week's educational program on Women's Leadership Issues included no less than thirteen sessions on a wide variety of topics. Some highlights and personal favorites of the delegates included an introductory workshop conducted by FFCNC member, Charlotte Hamlin, on social styles of leaders using the well-known Myers-Briggs psychological types assessment and the final session which was conducted by Janet Carlson, Innovation Operations Manager of the Center for Creative Leadership, on individual leadership philosophies and how these play out in work and other environments.

Along the way, each Kosovar delegate made a presentation to Open World program participants who work in similar professional areas. Following Albulena's presentation during the Welcome Dinner, at the Triad Health Project, a Greensboro non-profit addressing HIV/AIDS issues, Rajmonda Sylbije made a presentation on LGBT (lesbian, gay, bi-sexual, and transgender) issues in Kosovo; at the Nussbaum Center for Entrepreneurship Lendita Kastrati made a presentation about the Kosovo Women's Chamber of Commerce; and at the Greensboro Police Department Fjolla Raifi made a presentation about women working in the security sector in Kosovo.

Our guests enjoyed meeting US Representative Howard Coble while in Washington, DC for their orientation. While in the Triad they met several local women politicians including Executive Associate Dean for Academic Affairs at the WFU Law School, Suzanne Reynolds, who ran for the NC Supreme Court; former NC State Senator Linda Garrou; and Greensboro Mayor Pro-Tem Yvonne Johnson and City Council Member Nancy Hoffmann.

As is always the case with an inbound exchange, and even more so with an Open World program that includes an educational component, many FFCNC members contribute to the success of the program. In addition to our exchange directors,

many thanks go to Tim Prout, Charlotte Hamlin, Peter Peiffer, Joy Griffin and Sandy Bundgaard who helped with planning the program and day hosting; to Marilyn Baird, Marta Rhodes, the Norths, Browns, Kahls, Parks, Nussbaums, Kiszelys, Catherine Magid, and Margot Robinson who hosted our guests; and to the Andresens, Cauthens, Charlotte Hamlin, Karla Shanahan, and Judy Greene who hosted dinners. The week concluded with a Farewell dinner at Taste of Thai in Greensboro on January 17 during which time each of our guests shared a few parting comments:

Albulena said that she was initially reluctant to be involved in the program, but that it proved to be a great learning experience. She added that hospitality is very important in Kosovar culture and we taught her about American hospitality which she appreciated very much. She hopes to visit FFCNC members when the club travels to Moldova in the fall and would like to establish a FF club in Kosovo someday.

Rajmonda described the week as the "best visit of my life" and thanked everyone for a perfectly organized program. She was grateful to meet parents of gay and lesbian North Carolinians and learned that she will have to be patient in her quest for equal rights in Kosovo. She feels that in time they will be able to talk openly in Kosovo about these issues and will be able to worship side by side.

Lendita echoed the comments of her fellow delegates and said that she has many messages to take home.

Fjolla said that she learned the difference between a leader and a boss and also that she should not be afraid to bring up challenging and taboo subjects. She plans to put into action everything she learned including that she should never give up where women's issues are concerned nor give up on her dreams, one of which is to return to the US for graduate studies. She ended with a quote she learned while in the US: "If you educate a man, you educate a person. If you educate a woman, you educate a nation."

All of the delegates had glowing thanks for Charlotte Hamlin who led all the dinner guests in a final rendition of "This Little Light of Mine," the key verses of which were:

This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine. Everywhere I go, I'm gonna let it shine. Back in Kosovo, I'm gonna let it shine.

Let's Toast to Moldova

Exchange Director, Barton Parks, continues to work on plans for our 2014 out-bound exchange. Though dates are not yet set, the last week of August is being targeted. Along with the mentoring activities that will take place to assist the Moldovans in establishing a Friendship Force club, there will be many cultural activities, including a one night stay in a small village outside of the capital city of Chisinau. Also expected is a visit to an underground winery and a large annual festival held at this time of the year.

Wine Industry in Moldova

Moldova is known for its wines. For centuries viticulture and winemaking were the general occupation of the population. It has a vineyard area of 360,000 acres. Most of the country's wine production is exported. Many families have their own recipes and strands of grapes that have been passed down through generations. Cricova, not far from Chisinau, is one of the largest wine cellars in the world with 75 miles (yes, MILES!) of tunnel-like storage galleries. But the largest in the world is Milestii Mici, founded in 1969, with 120 miles of tunnels. The limestone in these galleries maintains constant humidity and temperature. Milestii Mici holds 2 million bottles of wine – 70% red, 20% white, and 10% dessert.
